In one scene, a drill sergeant uses harsh insults. Overall, language is moderate and not a primary concern for teens, but it may be surprising for younger children accustomed to PG movies.

Sexual Content and Nudity

Sexual situations are handled discreetly but exist:

- Jenny is shown working at a strip club, but no nudity is visible. The camera shows her back and suggests she is topless, but it is implied rather

than explicit.

- Forrest and Jenny have a sexual relationship off-screen; the morning after, they are shown in bed together, partially covered.
- A brief scene shows Jenny's college friend exposing her breast during a protest (seen quickly).
- There are a few innuendos: a doctor asks about "sexual relations," and Forrest's recounting of his "running and running" is a euphemism.

Drug and Alcohol Use
