Physical Library Card vs. Digital Library Card

Understanding the difference between these two credentials is essential. The physical Reader Identification Card is issued at the Library's Madison Building. It is free, valid for two years, and requires an in-person visit. With this card, you can request books, manuscripts, films, and other physical materials to use in the reading rooms. You can also access many of the Library's subscribed databases while on-site.

The digital card, on the other hand, is simply an online account you create through the Library's website. While it does not grant you on-site privileges, it unlocks a substantial collection of digital content. The LOC has partnered with major publishers to offer access to thousands of e-books, scholarly journals, and historical archives remotely. This account is especially valuable for researchers who cannot travel to Washington, D.C.

HOW TO OBTAIN A LIBRARY OF CONGRESS LIBRARY CARD

Getting your own **Library of Congress library card** is a straightforward process, but it does require advance planning if you are not local to the D.C. area. Here is a step-by-step guide:

Step 1: Determine Which Card You Need

If you plan to visit the Library in person, you need the physical Reader Identification Card. If you only want online access, register for a digital account through the LOC website. Some researchers eventually get both.

Step 2: Prepare Your Identification

For the physical card, bring a valid, unexpired government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license, passport, or state ID. The ID must include your full name, date of birth, and a recent photograph. For minors under 16, a parent or guardian must accompany them, but the age limit is generally 16 and older.

Step 3: Visit the Reader Registration Office

The physical card can only be obtained in person at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. The Reader Registration Office is located on the ground floor of the James Madison Memorial Building (101 Independence Ave SE). Hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The process takes about 15 minutes. You will fill out a brief application, have your photo taken, and receive your card on the spot.

Step 4: Activate Your Digital Account

To obtain a digital card for remote access, go to loc.gov and click on "Register." You will create a username and password and provide your name and email address. Within minutes, you can start exploring the digital collections. However, note that the digital card alone does not allow you to request physical materials.

BENEFITS AND RESOURCES ACCESSIBLE WITH YOUR LIBRARY CARD

Once you hold a **Library of Congress library card**, a wealth of resources becomes available. The Library's collections are staggering in scope. Here are some highlights of what you can access:

Digital Collections

The LOC has one of the most extensive digital archives in the world. With your card (either physical or digital), you can view millions of digitized items, including:

- **Historical newspapers** from the Chronicling America project, covering 1789–1963.
- **Rare books and manuscripts**, such as Thomas Jefferson's library and the Gutenberg Bible.
- **Maps and atlases** spanning centuries.
- **Photographs and prints** from the Civil War, the Great Depression, and more.
- **Sound recordings and films** from early motion pictures to folk music archives.

Research Databases and E-Books

Through the Library's "eResources" portal, cardholders gain free access to premium databases that normally require a paid subscription. These include:

- **JSTOR, ProQuest, and Gale** academic databases.
- **ScienceDirect, SAGE Journals** for scientific and social science research.
- **Ancestry.com and Fold3** for genealogy.
- **OverDrive and EBSCO** for e-books and audiobooks.

On-Site Reading Rooms and Special Services

If you visit the Library, your physical card allows you to:

- Request materials from the general and special collections.
- Use the Main Reading Room in the Jefferson Building—a stunning architectural masterpiece.
- Consult with reference librarians who are experts in specific fields.
- Access the Law Library, the Manuscript Division, the Geography and Map Division, and others.
- Copy and scan materials (subject to copyright and condition guidelines).

1. **Plan ahead if visiting in person.** Check the Library's website for reading room hours and any closures. Some materials require advance notice of 24–72 hours to retrieve from storage.
2. **Use the catalog system.** Before you arrive, search the LOC's online catalog to identify call numbers and verify availability. This saves time.
3. **Renew your card before it expires.** The physical card is valid for two years. You can renew it by visiting the Registration Office again or, in some cases, by mail if you have used it recently.
4. **Explore the digital resources first.** Many items are already digitized, so you might not need to travel. Start with the LOC's digital collections and the eResources portal.
5. **Take advantage of librarian assistance.** The reference librarians are among the best in the world. Do not hesitate to ask for help navigating a complex collection.
6. **Respect the rules.** No food or drink in reading rooms. Use pencils only. Handle materials with care. These rules ensure the collections are preserved for future generations.

COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUT THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS LIBRARY CARD

Is the Library of Congress library card free?

Yes, the physical Reader Identification Card and the digital account are both free of charge.

Can I check out books and take them home?

No. The Library of Congress is a non-circulating research library. You must use materials in the reading rooms. However, the Library does allow limited interlibrary loan for certain items through your local library, but that is a separate process.

Do I need an appointment to get a card?

No appointment is necessary for the physical card. Simply visit the Registration Office during operating hours. For the digital card, you can register online anytime.

Can I get a Library of Congress library card if I

live outside the United States?

Yes, but you must visit in person to obtain the physical card. For the digital card, you only need internet access and a valid email address. Some online resources may require a U.S. IP address, but many are globally accessible.

What if I lose my card?

You can request a replacement at the Registration Office. There may be a small administrative fee (usually a few dollars), but it is generally handled quickly.

Does the card work at other

libraries?

No. The card is specific to the Library of Congress. However, the Library participates in the Federal Depository Library Program, and many items are available at depository libraries nationwide.
