Furthermore, visiting a magician or fortune-teller to learn about the unseen or to seek help negates one's acceptance of Islam, as stated in numerous authentic hadiths.

The Prophet ﷺ said, "Recite the last two verses of Surah Al-Baqarah, for they suffice (or protect) from all evil" (Sahih al-Bukhari). Making a habit of reading the entire surah in the home is also known to keep shayateen away for three days.

4. MORNING AND EVENING ADHKAR

Consistent recitation of the prescribed morning and evening supplications creates a fortress around the believer. These include verses like "Hasbiyallahu la ilaha illa huwa alayhi tawakkaltu wa huwa rabbul arshil azeem" (Allah is sufficient for

me...). The more a person depends on Allah, the less vulnerable they become.

5. MAINTAINING WUDU (ABLUTION)

Staying in a state of purity reduces the influence of shayateen. The angels of mercy are present when a person is in wudu.

6. CHARITY (SADAQAH)
