Pre-Start Checklist

Routine Maintenance Intervals

The manual shows you how to remove, gap, and reinstall plugs. Always use a torque wrench to tighten to specified foot-pounds to avoid stripping threads in the aluminum cylinder head.

- Clogged carburetor – clean per manual instructions or have serviced.
- Spark plug fouled – clean or replace.
- Incorrect fuel/oil ratio – drain and mix correctly.

STORAGE AND WINTERIZATION

Properly storing your Mercury 25hp 2 stroke outboard is essential, especially if you live in a region with freezing temperatures. The owner’s manual outlines a complete winterization process:

2. Disconnect the fuel line and run the carburetor dry until the engine stalls (prevents gum deposits).
