5. **Not checking**

answers: A quick multiplication often reveals errors. Encourage students to always verify.

- **Level 6**

(Cubes): Factor $27x^3 + 8$.

Answer: $(3x + 2)(9x^2 - 6x + 4)$

- **Level 7**

(Complete factoring):

Factor $5x^3 - 20x$.

Answer: $5x(x - 2)(x + 2)$

These examples demonstrate progression. A student who can work through all seven levels is well-prepared for any Algebra 2 assessment.
