THE WHITE WITCH AND THE FORCES OF EVIL

Tilda Swinton as Jadis, the White

Witch

him immediately endearing. His scene with Lucy in his cozy cave dwelling, complete with tea and scones, is one of the most beloved sequences in the film. The fear and relief in his eyes when he finally decides to let her go is deeply touching. Dawn French as Mrs. Beaver

The beloved British comedienne Dawn French voiced and performed (via motion capture) Mrs. Beaver, the warm, no-nonsense wife of Mr. Beaver. French brings her signature comedic timing and earthy charm to the role, providing much-needed levity during the darker segments of the story. Mrs. Beaver is practical, protective, and fiercely loyal to Aslan. French's performance ensures that the Beavers feel like real, loving characters rather than mere anthropomorphic animals. Her banter with her husband and her unyielding faith in Aslan's return are both

heartwarming and inspiring.

Ray Winstone as Mr. Beaver

Ray Winstone, known for his tough-guy roles in films like *Sexy Beast* and *The Departed*, lent his distinctive gravelly voice to Mr. Beaver. Winstone brings a gruff but lovable energy to the character. Mr. Beaver is the first ally to guide the Pevensie children on their journey, and Winstone's performance conveys both wisdom and courage. His storytelling about Aslan and the prophecy of the four thrones is delivered with a folksy authority that makes the mythology of Narnia feel ancient and real.

Jim Broadbent as Professor Digory Kirke

adventures in the wardrobe might be real. His famous line to Susan and Peter—"Logic! Why don't they teach logic at these schools?"—is delivered with perfect deadpan wit. Broadbent's performance grounds the magical story in a sense of scholarly curiosity and hidden knowledge. For readers of the entire Narnia series, Professor Kirke is a character with his own rich history, and Broadbent's portrayal honors that legacy.

ASLAN: THE VOICE OF POWER AND GRACE

Liam Neeson as

the Voice of Aslan

The majestic lion Aslan, the true king of Narnia, is voiced by the unmistakable Liam Neeson. Neeson's deep, resonant voice embodies the dignity, power, and boundless compassion of C.S. Lewis's Christ-figure. He was not physically present on set, but Neeson's vocal performance is integral to the film's emotional impact. His delivery of lines like "Do not cite the deep magic to me, Witch. I was there when it was written" is both regal and poignant. Neeson captures Aslan's duality—he is both a fearsome king and a gentle guide. The scenes depicting Aslan's sacrifice on the

Stone Table are among the most powerful in modern fantasy cinema, and Neeson's voice conveys an almost otherworldly peace and resignation. He made Aslan a character of profound spiritual weight, accessible to audiences of all backgrounds.

Rupert Everett as the Fox
