KEY COMPETENCY AREAS FOR NURSING STUDENT EVALUATIONS

Clinical skills form the foundation of nursing practice. Evaluation comments in this area should address a student's ability to perform procedures safely, accurately, and efficiently. Comments should also note the student's adherence

to infection control protocols, proper technique, and ability to adapt skills to different patient situations.

- "Demonstrates safe medication administration practices. Always checks the rights of medication administration, verifies patient identity with two identifiers, and asks clarifying questions when unsure about an order."
- "With guidance, was able to perform a head-to-toe assessment in a systematic manner. Needs to work on prioritizing assessment findings and recognizing which abnormalities require immediate attention."

Critical Thinking and Clinical Judgment

Critical thinking is perhaps the most important competency a nursing student can develop. It involves the ability to analyze patient data, recognize patterns, anticipate complications, and make sound clinical decisions. Evaluation comments should reflect a student's progress in moving from rote memorization to independent clinical reasoning.

Sample comments for critical thinking include:

- "The student demonstrates strong critical thinking skills. When the patient's blood pressure dropped suddenly, she immediately assessed for other signs of bleeding and notified the charge nurse without delay."
- "Continues to rely heavily on the instructor for decision-making. When faced with a change in patient condition, the student freezes and waits for direction rather than initiating an assessment."
- "Shows improvement in recognizing abnormal lab values and connecting them to the patient's clinical presentation. This week, she correctly identified that the patient's low potassium level

could be contributing to cardiac arrhythmias."

- "Needs to develop better prioritization skills. The student tends to focus on one task at a time without considering which tasks are most urgent. With coaching, she was able to reorganize her assignments and complete care in a more logical order."
- "Demonstrates excellent ability to anticipate patient needs. She consistently checks on pain levels, offers toileting assistance before it becomes urgent, and prepares equipment ahead of time for procedures."

Communication and Interpersonal Skills

Effective communication is essential for patient safety, teamwork, and patient satisfaction. Evaluation comments in this area should address interactions with patients, families, instructors, and other healthcare professionals. Communication includes both verbal and non-verbal elements, as well as the ability to document clearly and accurately.

Sample comments for communication include:

- "Communicates clearly and professionally with patients and families. She introduces herself by name and role, explains procedures in simple terms, and checks for understanding before proceeding."
- "Needs to work on assertiveness when communicating with physicians. The student understands the importance of reporting critical lab values but hesitates when calling a physician and sometimes omits key information."
- "Demonstrates excellent active listening skills. Patients

consistently report feeling heard and understood after interactions with this student."

- "Documentation is thorough and timely. The student writes clear, objective, and complete notes that reflect the nursing process."
- "Struggles with interprofessional communication. The student tends to avoid speaking up during team huddles and needs encouragement to share observations and ask questions."

Professionalism

and Accountability

Professionalism encompasses a wide range of behaviors, including punctuality, appearance, adherence to policies, ethical conduct, and accountability for one's actions. These qualities are fundamental to building trust with patients and colleagues.

Sample comments for professionalism include:

- "Consistently arrives on time and ready to work. The student comes prepared with necessary supplies, completed pre-assignment work, and a positive attitude."
- "Demonstrates a strong sense of accountability. When she made a medication error, she reported it immediately and participated fully in the incident review process without making excuses."
- "Needs to improve adherence to the dress code policy. The student has been reminded multiple times about wearing appropriate footwear and keeping nails short and unpolished."
- "Shows respect for patient confidentiality. The student is careful not to discuss patient information in public areas and logs out of the computer system when stepping away."
- "Takes initiative in seeking learning opportunities. She

regularly asks to observe procedures, volunteers for additional assignments, and follows up on patient outcomes."

Organization and Time Management

Nursing requires the ability to manage multiple tasks, prioritize competing demands, and complete care within a limited timeframe. Students often struggle with organization during their early clinical experiences, making this an important area for feedback.

Sample comments for organization and

time management include:

- "Shows noticeable improvement in organization. This week, the student created a prioritized to-do list at the start of shift and successfully completed all morning care tasks before 10 AM."
- "Continues to have difficulty with time management. The student spends too long on individual tasks, which causes delays in completing care for other patients. Needs to develop a more efficient workflow."
- "Demonstrates excellent ability to cluster care. She recognizes when patients can be bathed, medicated, and assessed during the same visit rather than making

multiple trips."

- "Needs to anticipate interruptions and build flexibility into the daily plan. When an admission occurred mid-shift, the student became flustered and struggled to adjust her schedule."
- "Uses downtime productively. When patient care was completed early, the student used the time to review medication cards and practice skills in the simulation lab."

HOW TO WRITE CONSTRUCTIVE EVALUATION COMMENTS

Writing effective evaluation comments is a skill that improves with practice. The best comments are specific, behavioral, balanced, and forward-looking. Specific

comments describe exactly what the student did or did not do. For example, instead of saying "you did well with patient care," a specific comment would say "you consistently checked on your patient every hour and offered pain medication before it was requested." Behavioral comments focus on observable actions rather than personality traits. Saying "the student needs to improve hand hygiene compliance" is more helpful than saying "the student is careless."

Balanced comments include both strengths and areas for improvement. Even students who are struggling have strengths that can be acknowledged, and even strong students have areas where they can grow. A good rule of thumb is to include at least one positive

comment for every constructive comment. Forward-looking comments offer guidance for future improvement. Instead of simply stating a problem, suggest a strategy or resource that can help the student grow.

Avoid using vague language such as "good," "poor," "needs improvement," or "satisfactory" without explanation. These words do not provide enough information for the student to understand what they did well or what they need to change. Also avoid comparing students to each other. Focus on the individual student's progress relative to course objectives and their own starting point.

COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID IN

Even experienced instructors can fall into certain traps when writing evaluation comments. One common pitfall is the halo effect, where a student who excels in one area is assumed to excel in all areas.
