For example, in the third stanza, Rizal writes about dying for the fatherland: "A ti, facinorosa, / No tiendo yo mi mano." Derbyshire translates this as: "To thee, unnatural race, I stretch not forth my hand." The word "facinorosa" (criminal) is softened to "unnatural race," reflecting a more diplomatic tone while keeping the critical spirit.

The **Me Ultimo Adios English Version** by Derbyshire remains the standard for scholars and schools alike. It is often recited on Rizal Day in the Philippines, but its influence extends far beyond national borders. The poem's themes of martyrdom, love of country, and hope for redemption resonate universally, making it a staple in world literature courses.

The use of biblical imagery (Sodom) suggests moral decay. This stanza is often quoted in discussions about resistance against corrupt regimes.

## The Fourth and Fifth Stanzas: Visions of the Afterlife

"I die but still I leave my spirit to thy keeping, / And if my soul should find its rest beyond the skies, / In the eternal dawn of a day without a setting, / There will I wait for thee, my country, till thou dost arise." These lines are among the most hopeful in the **Me Ultimo Adios English Version**. Rizal imagines a future where the Philippines is free, and he waits in the afterlife to witness its rebirth. The imagery of "dawn without a setting" signifies eternal freedom—a powerful metaphor that has inspired generations of activists.

Some translators sacrifice rhythm for clarity, while others sacrifice literal meaning for beauty.
