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Gwinnett County Public Schools (GCPS) uses the CogAT as a key component in

identifying students who may benefit from advanced academic programs, including the **Gwinnett County Gifted Program**. The test is typically administered to all first-grade students in the district. The results of the CogAT are used alongside other criteria, such as achievement test scores, teacher recommendations, and classroom performance, to make decisions about gifted program placement. ## The Verbal Battery

For first graders, the verbal battery is largely picture-based because reading skills are still developing. The main subtests include:

- **Picture Analogies:** Your child will see a pair of pictures that have a relationship, and then a single picture. They must choose a

picture from several options that completes the second pair in the same way.

- **Sentence Completion:** Your child will hear a sentence with a missing word and must choose the correct word from a set of pictures to complete the sentence logically.
- **Picture Classification:** Your child will see a set of pictures that belong to a certain group or category. They must then select another picture that fits into the same group.

# The Quantitative Battery

The quantitative battery for first graders focuses on basic number sense and pattern recognition. The subtests are:

- **Number Analogies:** Similar to picture analogies but using numbers and objects. Your

child will see a relationship between numbers, such as 2 and 4, and then a single number. They must find a second number that follows the same relationship.

- **Number Puzzles:** Your child will be shown a simple equation or visual representation of a quantity and must figure out the missing part. This is an early introduction to algebraic thinking.
- **Number Series:** Your child will see a sequence of numbers or objects in a pattern and must

choose the next one in the sequence.

Practice with these types of questions can help your child recognize patterns more quickly.

## The Nonverba I Battery

This battery is often considered the most abstract and is a pure measure of reasoning without language or numbers. The subtests are:

- **Figure Matrices:** Your child will see a 2x2 grid with three figures and one empty cell. They must determine the

relationship between the figures in the top row and apply that relationship to the bottom row to find the missing figure.

- **Paper Folding:**

Your child will see a square piece of paper being folded and then hole-punched. They must select the image that shows what the paper will look like when unfolded.

- **Figure Classification:**

Your child will see a set of three figures that share a common characteristic. They must choose another figure from the options that

shares the same characteristic.

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## **HOW TO EFFECTIVELY USE A COGAT PRACTICE TEST FOR 1ST GRADE IN GWINNETT COUNTY**

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Finding the right practice materials is only the first step. How you use them with your child makes a significant difference. Here are some strategies for parents in Gwinnett County:

### **1. Start Early, But Keep It Light:**

The goal is familiarization, not drilling.

### **2. Simulate the Testing Environment:**

When your child gets a question wrong, do not simply tell them the correct answer. Walk through the reasoning



process together. Ask questions like, "What made you choose that answer?" and "Let's look at the pattern again." This builds metacognitive skills.

4. **Focus on the Nonverbal Battery:** Many parents find that the nonverbal section is the most unfamiliar to their children. Dedication of extra practice time to figure matrices and paper folding can be very beneficial.
5. **Use Local and Relevant Materials:** When searching for a practice test, look for resources that are specifically

**Puzzles:** Jigsaw

puzzles, tangrams, and logic puzzles are excellent for developing spatial and nonverbal reasoning skills.

- **Use Math in Daily Life:**

Count items at the grocery store, sort laundry by color or size, or figure out how many more plates are needed for dinner. This builds quantitative thinking naturally.

- **Read Together:**

Reading aloud exposes your child to new vocabulary and sentence structures, which directly supports the verbal

battery. After reading, ask your child to predict what might happen next.

## WHAT TO EXPECT ON TEST DAY IN GWINNETT COUNTY

Knowing the logistics of test day can help you prepare your child emotionally and logistically. The CogAT is typically administered to entire first-grade classes in Gwinnett County over several days to avoid fatigue. Each battery is given separately. The entire testing process may take approximately two to three hours in total, spread out. Your child will take the test in their regular classroom with their teacher and classmates. It is

administered in a group setting. The test is not timed per question, but each subtest has an overall time limit. For first graders, the test administrator reads the instructions aloud and may read some of the questions. Your child will mark their answers in a test booklet or on an answer sheet, depending on the format used by the school.

To ensure your child is ready:

- **Prioritize Sleep:** A well-rested child performs better. Ensure your child goes to bed early and has a calm morning routine.
- **Eat a Good Breakfast:** A nutritious breakfast that

energy is important. Avoid sugary foods that could lead to a crash.

- **Discuss the Test Positively:** Frame the test as a chance to show how good they are at solving puzzles and thinking. Avoid putting pressure on them about the outcome. Use language like, "You get to do some fun puzzles today!"
- **Send a Note of Encouragement:** A small, encouraging note in their lunchbox can do wonders for their confidence.

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## ABOUT THE COGAT

There are several myths surrounding the CogAT that can cause unnecessary stress for parents and children. It is helpful to separate fact from fiction.

- **Myth: The CogAT is an IQ test.** While it measures cognitive abilities, it is not a pure IQ test. It is an aptitude test that can be influenced by a child's experiences and exposure to certain types of thinking.
- **Myth: You cannot prepare for the CogAT.** While you cannot "cram" for it, familiarizing your child with the

format and question types can reduce anxiety and improve performance. Practice helps a child understand what is being asked.

- **Myth: A low score means your child is not smart.** The CogAT is a single

snapshot taken on one day. Many factors can influence a young child's performance, including fatigue, anxiety, or simply not understanding the format. A low score does not define your child's intelligence or potential.
