S Defining Performa nce

At just 21 years old, DiCaprio delivered a tour de force that signaled his transition from child actor (known for *What's Eating Gilbert Grape*) to serious dramatic talent. His portrayal of Jim Carroll is unflinchingly honest. He captures the character's boyish charm and athletic grace in the early scenes, making his eventual fall all the
