Centering and Margins

This is especially true for classic foreign stamps where centering standards were often less consistent.

Asian and Pacific Stamps

Japan, China, and other Asian countries have seen rapidly growing collector interest. Chinese stamps, particularly those from the Cultural Revolution period and early imperial issues, can be extremely valuable. However, forgery is a significant concern, so provenance and expertization are critical. Australian and New Zealand stamps are also popular, especially early issues and those featuring indigenous themes.

Latin American and African Stamps

Stamps from Latin America and Africa offer many opportunities for specialized collectors. Some countries issued large numbers of stamps, but specific issues can be quite scarce. Political instability and limited printing records make accurate pricing challenging. However, dedicated collectors can find real bargains. Price guides for these areas are less comprehensive, and market values may be more variable.

Printed Catalogs

Some sellers, particularly on online marketplaces, list stamps at inflated prices based on outdated or unrealistic catalog values. Always cross-reference multiple sources before paying a high price.
