They calculate the value of the perfume—about three hundred denarii, which was roughly a year's wages for a laborer. They argue that the perfume could have been sold and the money given to the poor.

Jesus' response is remarkable and has echoed through the centuries. He defends the woman, saying, "Leave her alone. Why are you bothering her? She has done a beautiful thing to me. She has done what she could." He then makes a striking declaration: "Truly I tell you, wherever the gospel is preached throughout the world, what she has done will also be told, in memory of her." This moment is the very essence of the phrase "**Something Beautiful For God**". The woman's act was not pragmatic, efficient, or calculated. It was extravagant, wasteful in the eyes of some, and deeply personal. It was a gift

of pure love.

The Lesson of Extravagant Love

This biblical account challenges a utilitarian mindset that often reduces faith to a list of duties, rules, or social programs. The woman at Bethany teaches us that there is a place for pure, uncalculated devotion. Her offering was not about meeting a need in the most efficient way possible. It was about expressing a love so profound that it overflowed into a costly, beautiful gesture. She gave what was most precious to her, not because it was required, but because her heart compelled her.
