Antagonists and

- **Calypso (Vanessa Williams):** The nymph who holds Odysseus captive for seven years. The film emphasizes her seductive power and her eventual heartbreak, adding a layer of sympathy.
- **Circe (Bernadette Peters):** The sorceress who turns men into swine. The movie portrays her as both dangerous and lonely, and Odysseus's confrontation with her is a key test of his wits.
- **Polyphemus the Cyclops:** A terrifying giant rendered with practical effects. The study guide can compare the film's horror to the poem's more brutal

description.

- **The Suitors:** A collective antagonist, led by Antinous (Michael J. Pollard). Their arrogance and disrespect are vividly shown, building to the violent climax.

MAJOR THEMES AND SYMBOLISM

Cleverness Over

Brute Strength

The Role of the Gods

Athena helps Odysseus, while Poseidon opposes him. The film shows the gods as active, capricious forces. A study guide might list interventions and ask whether the gods in the movie seem more like characters or metaphors.
