Solution: The equation is $C = 15p + 95$. The \$95 is the fixed cost (y-intercept), and \$15 per person

is the variable cost (slope). For 120 people: $C = 15(120) + 95 = 1800 + 95 = \1895 . The total cost is \$1895.

TEST DAY STRATEGIES FOR THE ALGEBRA 1 KEYSTONE EXAM
