Madeline saves him, and the children learn a lesson about patience and understanding. The “bad hat” character offers a nuanced portrayal of a child acting out, prompting discussions about empathy and second chances. The book also features vibrant Spanish-influenced scenery and a touch of mischief that young readers adore.

Madeline and the Gypsies (1959)

Madeline and Pepito get lost during a trip to a carnival and end up joining a gypsy circus. They perform tricks and travel through the French countryside until Miss Clavel and the other girls rescue them. This book is filled with the

romance of circus life, colorful costumes, and a sense of freedom. It also touches on themes of home and belonging. Bemelmans' illustrations of the gypsy caravans and the beautiful French landscape are some of his most atmospheric.

Madeline in London (1961)
