thin, holds a crease well, and has one white side and one colored side, which adds visual interest to the finished butterfly.

- **A flat, clean work surface.** A table or desk with a smooth surface allows you to make crisp, accurate folds. Avoid soft or cluttered areas where your paper might shift.
- **A bone folder or a smooth, blunt object (optional).** This tool helps you create razor-sharp creases, but your fingernail works perfectly well for most folds.

- **Good lighting.**

Origami requires attention to detail, so make sure you can clearly see your paper and the fold lines.

If you do not have specific origami paper, you can cut a square from ordinary printer paper, wrapping paper, or even a magazine page. Just remember that thicker paper can be harder to fold precisely for detailed steps, while paper that is too thin may tear. The right paper thickness makes learning **how to make a origami butterfly step by step** much more enjoyable.

UNDERSTANDING YOUR ORIGAMI PAPER

Before you begin

folding, it helps to understand a few basic elements of origami paper. Most origami squares have a colored side and a white side. In the instructions that follow, you will be asked to start with the colored side facing up. This ensures that the most prominent part of your finished butterfly shows the color or pattern you chose. The white side will appear on the underside of the wings and in some interior folds, adding subtle contrast.

You will also encounter the terms "crease" and "unfold." A crease is a sharp fold that you make by running your fingernail or bone folder firmly along the folded edge. When you are asked to unfold, simply open the paper back to its previous flat shape. These crease

lines act as guides in later steps, so take the time to make them crisp and accurate. Good creases are the foundation of any successful origami project, and they are especially important when you are learning **how to make a origami butterfly step by step.**

Follow these instructions carefully, and take your time with each fold. The beauty of origami lies in precision and patience. If a fold does not look quite right, simply unfold and try again. With a little practice, you will be folding butterflies in just a few minutes.

Step 1: Create the Diagonal Creases

Place your square sheet of paper on the work surface with the colored side facing up. Fold the paper in half diagonally by bringing the top left corner down to meet the bottom right corner. Align the edges perfectly, then run your fingernail along the fold to create a sharp crease. Unfold the paper completely. Next, fold the paper diagonally in the other direction by bringing the top right corner down to meet the

bottom left corner. Crease firmly and unfold again. You should now have an X-shaped crease pattern across your square.

Step 2: Create the Horizontal and Vertical Creases

With the colored side still facing up, fold the paper in half horizontally by bringing the top edge down to meet the bottom edge. Crease and unfold. Then fold the paper in half vertically by

bringing the left edge over to the right edge. Crease and unfold. Your paper now has a grid of intersecting crease lines: two diagonals, one horizontal, and one vertical. These creases are essential for the next collapse step.

Step 3: Collapse into the Preliminary Triangle Base

This step is sometimes called a "waterbomb base" or a "triangle collapse." Hold the

paper so that the diagonal creases are running from corner to corner. Gently bring the left and right edges of the paper together, allowing the paper to fold along the horizontal and vertical creases. The paper should naturally collapse into a triangle shape with two flaps on the inside. Press the triangle flat, making sure the edges are aligned, and crease the sides firmly. You now have a triangle with a single point at the top and two open flaps at the bottom. This is the starting shape for many classic origami models and a key

Step 4: Fold the Top Layer Corners Upward

Place the triangle so the solid point is at the top and the open flaps are at the bottom, pointing toward you. Working only with the top layer of paper, take the right corner of
