Strategy: Use long division. Divide 2 by 3. 3 goes into 2 zero times, so add a decimal and a zero to make 20. 3 goes into 20 six times (18), leaving a remainder of 2. Bring down another zero to make 20 again. Notice the pattern—the remainder keeps repeating. The decimal is 0.666... which is written as 0.6 with a repeating bar. This problem introduces the concept of repeating decimals.
