Its closed-center hydraulic system was a revolutionary feature that provided tremendous lifting force and precise control. The 4020, which followed in 1963, is arguably the most famous tractor in the company’s history, with over 180,000 units sold. The **history of John Deere tractors** was forever changed by these models, which cemented Deere’s dominance in the tractor market for decades to come.

The 20 series (in the 1960s and 1970s) and the 30 series (in the 1970s) continued this legacy. Models like the 3020, 4020, and 4520 offered increasing power and refinement. During this period, John Deere also introduced its first four-wheel-drive articulated tractors, such as the 8010 and 8020, to handle the immense tasks of large-scale farming. The company was now a global powerhouse, exporting tractors to every continent.
