

# How To Raise Blood Pressure

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## UNDERSTANDING BLOOD PRESSURE AND THE NEED TO RAISE IT

Blood pressure is the force of blood pushing against the walls of your arteries as your heart pumps. It is recorded with two numbers: systolic (the pressure when the heart beats) over diastolic (the pressure when the heart rests between beats). ## DIETARY APPROACHES TO RAISE BLOOD PRESSURE

## Increase Your Sodium Intake

Sodium is often villainized for its role in high blood pressure, but for people with hypotension, a moderate increase in salt can help retain fluid and raise blood pressure. Adding a little extra salt to meals or choosing salty snacks like pretzels, olives, or pickles can be beneficial. ## Stay Well Hydrated

Dehydration reduces blood volume, which directly lowers blood pressure. Drinking enough water throughout the day is one of the simplest ways to raise blood pressure naturally. To counteract this, eat smaller meals every few hours instead of three large ones. Include complex carbohydrates like whole grains, lean proteins, and healthy fats to provide steady energy without dramatic blood pressure shifts.

## Include Foods Rich in Vitamin B12 and Folate

Deficiencies in vitamin B12 and folate can lead to anemia, which reduces red blood cell count and can cause low blood pressure. Eating foods such as eggs, fortified cereals, meat, fish, dairy, leafy greens, and legumes can help correct deficiencies. If dietary intake is insufficient, your doctor may recommend supplements.

## LIFESTYLE CHANGES TO ELEVATE BLOOD PRESSURE

Beyond diet, several daily habits can help you manage and raise low blood pressure.

## Wear Compression Stockings

Compression stockings (or compression socks) apply gentle pressure to your legs, helping blood flow back to the heart and preventing pooling in the lower extremities. This reduces the drop in blood pressure when you stand. They are especially useful for people with chronic orthostatic hypotension. Choose medical-grade stockings with appropriate compression levels as advised by your healthcare provider.

## Avoid Standing Up Too Quickly

When you rise suddenly, gravity pulls blood into your legs, and your body may not adjust fast enough, causing dizziness. Practice the counter-maneuver of sitting on the edge of the bed for a few minutes before standing, and then stand slowly. Pumping your ankles or clenching your thigh muscles before standing can also help push blood upward and raise blood pressure in the moment.

## Change Your Sleeping Position

Elevate the head of your bed by about 6–9 inches (using blocks or a wedge pillow). This reduces the drop in blood pressure upon waking and helps prevent morning dizziness. Sleeping with your head slightly raised also reduces the effect of gravity pulling blood away from the brain.

## Increase Physical Activity Gradually

Regular moderate exercise improves blood circulation and helps your body regulate blood pressure more effectively. Focus on activities that don’t involve sudden changes in position, such as walking, swimming, cycling, or yoga. Strong leg muscles help push blood back toward the heart. Always start slowly and avoid extreme heat or overexertion that could cause dehydration and lower pressure further.

## Manage Stress and Avoid Hot Environments

Heat causes blood vessels to dilate (widen), which lowers blood pressure. Avoid hot showers, saunas, steam rooms, and prolonged sun exposure. If you feel dizzy from heat, lie down with your feet elevated. Stress reduction techniques like deep breathing, meditation, and staying cool can help stabilize your readings.

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## MEDICAL INTERVENTIONS FOR CHRONIC LOW BLOOD PRESSURE

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When lifestyle and dietary changes are not enough, healthcare providers may consider medical treatments. These should always be prescribed and monitored by a professional.

# Medications to Raise Blood Pressure

- **Fludrocortisone:** A corticosteroid that helps increase blood volume by retaining sodium.

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## NATURAL REMEDIES AND ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

Increasing your intake of licorice root (in moderation) can reduce the breakdown of cortisol and raise blood pressure slightly, but it may affect potassium levels. Another simple yet effective tool is the "**blood pressure raising maneuver**"—when you feel a drop coming, cross your legs tightly and clench your thigh muscles. Similarly, squeezing a small ball in your hand or raising your arms overhead can help maintain pressure during standing.
