Step 1: Fill the Douche

Step 5: Let the Liquid Drain

After releasing the solution, remove the nozzle. Remain in position for a minute to let the liquid drain out completely.

You may experience some leakage. Place a towel under you if you are not in the shower. Do not douche again immediately. One session is enough.

Step 6: Clean Up and Clean Equipment

If using a disposable douche, discard the entire bottle and nozzle after one use. Never reuse disposable douches. If you used a reusable bulb, empty any remaining liquid, then wash the bulb and nozzle with warm soapy water. Rinse thoroughly and allow to air dry. Store in a clean, dry place.
